To assure the provision of medically accurate, comprehensive reproductive health education that enables Marysville Public Schools students to make healthy behavior choices through an abstinence-based education program

GOAL (a) Discuss the benefits of abstaining from sex until marriage and the benefits of ceasing sex if a pupil is sexually active.
